Georgie graduated from AC Arts 2015 majoring in Printmaking. She is interested in exploring a sense of place in relationship to landscapes encountered through a variety and combination of printmaking processes and drawing mediums.

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### Izabella Shaw

Izabella Shaw is a multidisciplinary artist whose works incorporates sculpture, moving image, and installation, amongst other mediums. Using quotidian and overlooked objects as her primary materials, Shaw's work deals with themes of connection, boundaries, and that which flows between. Izabella Shaw graduated the University of South Australia's Contemporary Art program in 2019, receiving the Constance Gordon-Johnson Award for Sculpture. Following this, Shaw secured a six month residency at George Street Studios supported by Helpmann Academy.

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### **Jake Holmes**

Jake Holmes is a visual artist based in South Australia, his work is predominantly screen printing and illustration. Jake has been regularly exhibiting works since 2010 and has work in several major collections. He was the co-founder of Tooth and Nail Studio Gallery in Adelaide and has just recently moved into a home studio where he also runs screen printing workshops. Jake also works as an art facilitator with the Flinders Medical Centre Arts in Health program.

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#### Joshua Searson

Joshua Searson is a printmaker whose work is often inspired by the urban environment. As well as exhibiting printmaking works, Josh has also undertaken several public art projects, including painting for the Wonderwalls Festival at Port Adelaide. Josh currently lectures in visual arts at Adelaide College of the Arts, where he originally studied printmaking.

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### Lloma Mackenzie

Combining inks, lino, paper and mixed media in the production of contemporary print-making, Lloma Mackenzie uses traditional and alternative methods of lino-cutting to create both delicate and bold artworks. Drawing inspiration from both the natural and man-made environments, Mackenzie's work explores the themes of place and memory. Employing layers of translucent inks, she crafts detailed exhibition pieces in both two-dimensional and installation forms

In the years since graduating, Mackenzie has worked out of her own Hills studio. She exhibits throughout Australia and internationally.

Although Lloma has been a resident of Australia for over forty years, she has retained her links with New Zealand, where she was born and travels to France regularly. She works from her studios in Mount Barker, South Australia and Rinhaudette, SW France.

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### Lorelei Medcalf

Lorelei Medcalf is an artist, printmaker, teacher and curator. Accompanied by a red dog, her daily walks along the Fleurieu coastline provide inspiration for her artworks; whether it's the natural or man-made detritus washed up on the beach, or her encounters with humans and animals.
